1. INTRODUCING OURSELVES

Hello!

Hello my friend (m./f.) / friends !

My last name is...and my first name...

in English

but in Latin...

SALVE (sg) / **SALVETE** (pl) !

Salve amice / amica // salvete amici !

Mihi nomen est..... et praenomen.....

vulgo... (= "in the vulgar tongue", "in the vernacular")

Latine autem... ("autem" always in 2nd position)

tibi (vobis) licet... (impersonal verb + dative)

me appellare (infinitive clause, subject of "licet")

2. TALKING ABOUT OUR INTERESTS AND WHAT WE LIKE TO DO

(review 4th-conjugation verbs and verb objects)

We can't translate "I like riding, sports, Latin" literally. Instead, we have the following options:
